Thank you to Narjes and Penelope for their demonstration. 😊




Be SunSmart, Play SunSmart

School Wide Positive Behaviour Support (SWPBS)

School Wide Positive Behaviour Support (SWPBS) is a whole-school framework which provides staff at Ardeer South Primary and students with an approach to promote improved behaviour at our school.

At ASPS Primary School we use the School Wide Positive Behaviour Support Framework (SWPBS) to create an environment where our students thrive with their social, emotional and academic learning.

SWPBS is a school-wide approach to help support, define, teach and reinforce positive behaviours of ALL students. The school-wide approach to discipline focuses on building a safe and positive environment in which all students can learn.

Social Skill of the week

Our social skill focus for the week is 'We will follow the directions of all adults'. Students will be discussing, showing and practising this expected behaviour in all settings of our school.

We align our expected behaviours with our schools' values. We believe that following directions of adults in our school provides a safe environment for our students to learn, as well as teaches them to act responsibly.

At ASPS we consistently emphasise the significance of regular attendance at school. Attending primary school regularly lays a strong foundation for your child's future academic success and overall well-being. We believe that regular attendance benefits children in the following ways:

Online Safety

Online safety is extremely important. The school's internet service is tailored for use by primary school children and provides a secure and safe network. Last week students signed their Acceptable Use Agreement. This is designed to encourage behaviour that will help them stay safe online and become responsible users of IT. We ask parents to go through these agreements with their children, as we believe it is very important for school and parents to be working together on this issue.

Annual privacy reminder for our school community

Our school collects and uses student and parent personal information for standard school functions or where permitted by law, as stated in the <u>Schools'</u> <u>Privacy Policy</u> and the <u>Schools' Privacy Collection Notice</u>.
